

How to deposit

You can deposit material in the service in a number of ways:

- **Mediated deposit by e-mail:** send details of the publications you would like to deposit to deposit@lib.gla.ac.uk. Project staff will then establish if the copyright agreements applicable to your papers permit them to be added to the service.

- **Records imported from Reference Manager or Endnote:** The Project team have developed scripts to import bibliographic details from Reference Manager and EndNote databases. Departments or Faculties may choose this method of adding records to the ePrints service rather than asking staff to submit details individually.

- **Self-deposit:** Staff can opt to deposit content using an online form. Registration is required. You can register at <http://eprints.gla.ac.uk>.

What is the Glasgow ePrints Service?

The Glasgow ePrints Service (<http://eprints.gla.ac.uk>) is an online service developed to host the full text of published research material produced by members of the University of Glasgow. Material in the service is freely available to anyone. By making your research available in the service it will be more widely accessible, thus leading to greater visibility and impact. Services such as the Glasgow ePrints service are being developed by organisations worldwide.

- It is a mechanism for making research more widely available to academics and others worldwide
- It is not a publishing mechanism or a substitute for peer-reviewed journals - the ePrints Service has been developed to host material that has already been published
- The ePrints Service is intended to open up the scholarly research literature in the spirit of the Open Access Movement

The Glasgow ePrints service is managed by the **DAEDALUS Project** based in the University Library.

Benefits for you as a researcher

Your academic research is made available to the world scholarly community on a scale impossible in paper

The Glasgow ePrints Service makes available GU research currently dispersed across thousands of scholarly publications across many disciplines. Papers in the service are indexed by OAIster (<http://oaister.umdl.umich.edu>), a cross-repository search facility, and are also found by search engines such as Google and Yahoo.

Your research is stored in a central, searchable space

Rather than being distributed across a huge range of personal web sites research is stored in one central database. The ePrints service is a reliable alternative to making papers available on personal web sites.

Access to similar repositories worldwide

You will be able to search hundreds of repositories simultaneously, thus giving you free access to more of the research literature.

Easy access to your papers for students

Students can easily access your papers via the ePrints service.

- Helps free research output from access barriers and tolls
- Speeds up research sharing
- Provides a secure storehouse for research in perpetuity
- Enables cross-institutional searching, and quicker access to online research

Project staff are happy to check the copyright agreements relating to any material you would like to add to the repository. Many publishers now allow authors to deposit their papers in online repositories such as the Glasgow ePrints Service. Others may be willing to give permission. Project staff can advise you.
